

A New US Foreign Policy for Nigeria

1. Educating Policymakers and Drivers—Isolating Them From Destructive Policy Ideologies

We must prioritize policy education amongst the ruling class and civil society organizations. If we are unable to distinguish between our foes and our friends, we will continue to implement short-term policies from post-colonial dominance organizations that appear "good" for a four-year cycle but are harmful to our economy in the long run. For this reason, it is common for each administration to blame the one before it.

Politicians generally require carefully structured policy education to learn the origin, purpose, and short-term and long-term implications of the policies they formulate or promote. They ascend to office, not through academic processes to guarantee they are trained for the responsibilities but through elections; therefore, it will be costly to presume they know what is required to steer a country toward growth. Therefore, we must prioritize policy education among the ruling class through civil society engagements

and strategic training. Those in the civil society space must become highly knowledgeable in “policy wars”—taking cues from President Trump’s second-term policies, which crippled the agenda previously initiated by the Biden "autopen" presidency to destroy America’s sovereignty, economy, and global dominance.

We must recognize that the **suppliers of those dangerous policies are already in Nigeria, acting as consultants to our National Assembly, ministries, and executive arms of government. They use grants to drive foreign agendas in Nigeria and adopt pseudo-research, hand-holding the government toward destruction due to ignorance.**

Currently in Nigeria, several policy consultants and research centers are funded by radical-left organizations, with structures finely interwoven with our policy development systems, resulting in a sizeable number of our policymakers programmed to support the World Economic Forum/leftist-compliant policies. This makes the current policy reforms of President Trump seem unpopular and a misfit for Nigeria. However, with continued and strategic policy education, we are certain a much-needed alignment between our countries will be formed.

2. Externalization of the MAGA Doctrine: A Foreign Policy for Nigeria to Eradicate Elitist-Globalist Subversion

Nigeria, as a strategic partner to the United States, has become the primary breeding ground for the same radical leftist policies that recently pushed America to the brink of

chaos. Since taking office in January 2025, the Trump administration has implemented major policy reforms, including the following:

- The initiation of the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) to dismantle bureaucratic corruption.
- The swift termination of diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) programs, mandates, and preferences.
- The restoration of binary biological definitions of sex while rejecting gender ideology.
- Aggressive immigration enforcement, including mass deportations and border security.
- Withdrawal from the Paris Agreement, the World Health Organization, and over 31 other UN-affiliated multilateral institutions, with policies contrary to American interests.
- Comprehensive scientific reviews of vaccines and nutrition to address systemic toxicity.

These policy reforms have been instrumental in repositioning America on a historic path of greatness, even though to most of the world they seem radical. Across the world, the shocks are reverberating, such as at the 39th African Union General Assembly in February 2026 and the 58th United Nations Economic Commission for Africa's Conference of Ministers, which was held from 28 March to 2 April 2026. African countries were being arm-twisted to alter their fiscal policy to prioritize funding

vaccinations (under the guise of public health) to cover for President Trump's defunding of the World Health Organization (WHO), GAVI, and the United Nations.

The dismantling of USAID and freezing its funding following reports of its involvement in financing groups like Boko Haram creates an imperative to replicate these reforms in Nigeria. Radical leftists, elitist globalists, and population control proponents are using Nigeria as a laboratory to preserve the agendas currently being purged from the United States. In Nigeria, the Gates and Rockefeller Foundations have entrenched themselves within the legislative and executive branches, forcing policy changes via foreign grants. They use the Paris Agreement, from which America has withdrawn—to facilitate state capture of our agriculture sector, imposing patented, climate-smart, GMO seeds that require dependency on foreign seed organizations.

While the U.S. health secretary, under the MAHA program, is removing vaccine mandates, defunding mRNA programs, and prioritizing nutrition-based health over WHO-dictated protocols, Nigeria's health system remains in the grip of **Bill Gates**. With funding exceeding \$100 million, Gates exerts direct influence over the Ministry of Health, food and drug regulation, and biotechnology. Nigeria is coasting towards an orchestrated health crisis, which America is currently abandoning.

Organizations like the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA) have become foundational to Nigeria's agricultural structure for about 6 decades, and in pretending to help, they have created far more problems.

To this end, we propose that these **Trump-led reforms must inform foreign policy toward Nigeria, replacing the destructive initiatives of the Obama/Biden foreign**

policy. The era of foreign grants from organizations like the Gates and Rockefeller Foundations must end to prevent the further destruction of Nigeria's sovereignty and public health, and the introduction of a Nigerian-based DOGE will deal corruption a lethal blow in the country.

As a result, we are pursuing a policy reform that will result in the clampdown and expulsion of these transnational vandals, as their removal will indirectly reduce the country's level of insecurity.
